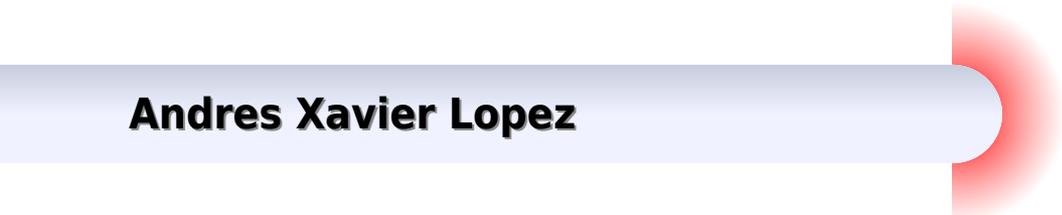

The Transformation of Stage Combat in Nineteenth Century England Andres Xavier Lopez,2019 For a majority of the nineteenth century in England stage combat consisted of set routines called standard combats With names such as Square Eights Round Eights and Glasgow Tens they consisted of a series of cuts with one s

sword at an opponent's blade Rather than create specific fights for individual productions actors used these set forms of fighting because they were simple effective and could be performed at a moment's notice However by the end of the century a new form of fighting dominated the English stage arranged combats These consisted of a duel based on historical fighting styles and techniques which were arranged by a fencing master or a combat historian I argue that two changing aspects of theatrical production coupled with significant changes in society affected the practice of stage combat First scenic and costume design progressed from settings and costumes intended only to suggest a generic historical time period to representing a specific historical era I show that to align stage combat with the trend towards more historical accuracy in productions historians in the second half of the nineteenth century started researching fighting styles of past eras They then shared their research with the public through demonstrations books and articles Other individuals began arranging historically accurate duels for the stage
