Many of the examples discussed are ones considered in the First Edition but the changes Cathy Nutbrown has made throughout the book bring it right up to date, including some speculation on the ideas of a Foundation Stage in England. There is much here that is valuable for reading alone but also a lot that could be shared by groups of people including those already working in the field as well as those in training.
