Why Learn GRAMMAR?

Learning Spanish grammar will help you speak and write in Spanish. It will also make you aware of your own grammar and help improve your English. So, let's get started!

WHAT IS GRAMMAR?

Grammar refers to the different ways of words in a language and gives rules on how to put words together to form correct sentences. When you speak (or write) in English, you don't often think about grammar. You know it's something to correct or fix just by the way it sounds or feels. You've developed this intuition about English after having spoken it for many years. When you learn a foreign language, you have to think about grammar and rules! This guide describes the different parts of Spanish and their uses in Spanish. It also explains grammar terms unique to Spanish, such as *ser* and *estar*, *por* and *para*, and *haber* and *haber*.

PRONUNCIATION

Spanish pronunciation is relatively easy since you know the sound that each letter (or combination of letters) makes.

Vowels

Spanish has five vowels.

- Each Spanish vowel always has the same sound.
- Spanish vowels are pure: they do not have a final glide, unlike many English vowels.

Consonants

- Spanish also has **diphthongs**, which are combinations of a strong vowel (a, e, or i) and a weak vowel (o, u) or two weak vowels. At the end of a word, the unstressed vowel (or vowels) with a glide, such as *ai* or *ei* (and *oi* after *ll*), and *au* (and *eu*) is a diphthong; the weak vowels are not stressed. The following are examples of some of these combinations. This is not a complete list.

COMBINATION	EXAMPLE
ai	vaiar (village)
ai	vai (city)
oi	vio (city)

Components

Spanish has twenty-two components.

- Unlike the pronunciation of Spanish vowels, Spanish components can vary in pronunciation, depending on where they occur in a word or what vowels precede or follow them. We are going to include only the basic sounds here.

NOTE: Depending on the region, *ll* is not a separate letter, but *ll*, *ll*, or *ll* (in all forms), and *ll* is called *ye* (or *ye*, *ye*, or *ye*), or *ye* (or *ye*, or *ye*). When you see someone how to spell *ye*, for example, they may say *ye* or *ye*, *ye*, or *ye*.

NOTE: Most Spanish words with the letters *g*, *je*, *je*, and *je* come from other languages. The "ll" pronunciation of *ll* and *ll* occurs only in certain regions of Spain. The letters *ll* and *ll* are pronounced the same. If the letter *ll* appears before *l* or *l* and has the sound of English *ll*, a *ll* (like *ll*) is placed above it to indicate that it has the sound of *ll*, e.g., *je* or *je*.

Combination

- Spanish also has **digraphs**, two letters that together represent a sound that is different from the sounds that individual letters normally make.

NOTE: The digraphs *ch*, *ll*, and *rr* used to be considered separate letters, but in 1989 the Royal Spanish Academy officially removed them from the alphabet.

Combination

The Spanish language prefers syllables that start with a consonant, so most syllables end with a vowel. The basic rules for creating syllables are as follows:

- Divide between two strong vowels (a, e, or i).
- Do not divide a diphthong (combination of weak and strong vowels) (e.g., *ai*, *ei*, *oi*).
- Divide between a weak vowel with a written accent and an unstressed vowel (e.g., *ca*).
- Divide two consonants that are between vowels (e.g., *ca*):
 - Do not divide consonant digraphs (e.g., *ca*).
 - Do not divide consonant clusters ending in *f* (with a glide) for those beginning with a *h* (e.g., *ca*).
- Divide between a written accent and a written accent (e.g., *ca*).
- Divide between a written accent and a written accent (e.g., *ca*).

Accent Rules

Spanish words follow very specific rules about where to place spoken stress and written accents.

- If a word ends in a vowel (a, e, or i) or a consonant (n, s, or ll), the stress falls on the penultimate (second to last) syllable unless specified (e.g., *ca*, *ca*, *ca*).
- If a word ends in a vowel (a, e, or i) or a consonant (n, s, or ll), the stress falls on the antepenultimate (third to last) syllable unless specified (e.g., *ca*, *ca*, *ca*).
- If a word ends in a consonant (b, c, d, g, k, p, q, r, t, v, x, z), the stress falls on the penultimate (second to last) syllable unless specified (e.g., *ca*, *ca*, *ca*).
- If a word ends in a vowel (a, e, or i) or a consonant (n, s, or ll), the stress falls on the antepenultimate (third to last) syllable unless specified (e.g., *ca*, *ca*, *ca*).
- If a word ends in a vowel (a, e, or i) or a consonant (n, s, or ll), the stress falls on the antepenultimate (third to last) syllable unless specified (e.g., *ca*, *ca*, *ca*).
