The Artist as Explorer Else Madelon Hooykaas, 2023 **The Artist Explorers** John Fairley, 2024-04-30 This is a visually stunning superb collection of artwork depicting British explorers and their journeys over the centuries It was in large part the lure of riches such as spices and gold and the promise of fertile land which tempted the British and other Europeans to venture out to unknown lands These intrepid explorers who devoted and often lost their lives on journeys of discovery were frequently accompanied by artists At the time there was no other way of pictorially recording their exploits and experiences James Cook and his botanist Joseph Banks had artists Alexander Buchan and Sydney Parkinson on board for their initial voyage to the South Seas Buchan s first pictures were of the natives of Tierra del Fuego as the Endeavour rounded Cape Horn but tragically within a month he died apparently of epilepsy Thomas Baines traveled with Livingstone while Charles Heaphy in New Zealand and the Governor s wife in India were amongst many others who produced drawings and paintings The many fine works in this book fashioned the British public s image of their countrymen s discoveries and later of the lives of those who remained in these faraway places Right up to the start of the 20th century their publication in the illustrated papers of the day became the core of popular appreciation Impact8: Borders and Crossings: the Artist as explorer Paul Liam Harrison, 2014 **If I May** Alan Alexander Milne, 1927 **The Frozen Zone and Its Explorers** Alexander Hyde, Abraham Chittenden Baldwin, William Leonard Gage, Charles Woodruff Shields, 1874 *If I May* A A Milne, 1920 A A Milne in full Alan Alexander Milne born January 18 1882 London England died January 31 1956 Hartfield Sussex English humorist the originator of the immensely popular stories of Christopher Robin and his toy bear Winnie the Pooh Milne s father ran a private school where one of the boy s teachers was a young H G Wells Milne went on to attend Westminster School London and Trinity College Cambridge the latter on a mathematics scholarship While at Cambridge he edited and wrote for Granta magazine then called The Granta for Cambridge s other river He took a degree in mathematics in 1903 and thereafter moved to London to make a living as a freelance writer In 1906 he joined the staff of Punch where he worked until 1914 writing humorous verse and whimsical essays He was married in 1913 and in 1915 though a pacifist he joined the service during World War I as a signalling officer He served briefly in France but he became ill and was sent home He was discharged in 1919 When he was not rehired by Punch Milne turned his attention to playwriting He achieved considerable success with a series of light comedies including Mr Pim Passes By 1921 and Michael and Mary 1930 Milne also wrote one memorable detective novel The Red House Mystery 1922 and a children s play Make Believe 1918 before stumbling upon his true literary m tier with some verses written for his son Christopher Robin These grew into the collections When We Were Very Young 1924 and Now We Are Six 1927 These remain classics of light verse for children Despite Milne s success as a playwright only these verses and his two sets of stories about the adventures of Christopher Robin and his toy animals Pooh Piglet Tigger Kanga Roo Rabbit Owl and Eeyore as told in Winnie the Pooh 1926 and The House at Pooh Corner 1928
