



CLASSROOM TEACHER

1. To instruct, train, or educate a group of students in a classroom or school setting. Classroom teachers are responsible for planning lessons, delivering instruction, and assessing student learning. They often work in elementary, middle, or high schools, and may also teach in private or charter schools.

2. To manage the classroom and ensure a safe and productive learning environment. Classroom teachers are responsible for setting classroom rules, managing behavior, and creating a positive learning atmosphere. They may also be involved in parent-teacher conferences and other school activities.

3. To collaborate with colleagues and other professionals in the field. Classroom teachers often work in teams or as part of a larger faculty, and may be involved in professional development activities and research.
