**Theories of Play and Postmodern Fiction** Brian Edwards, 2013-05-13

Drawing on developments in critical theory and postmodernist fiction this study makes an important contribution to the appreciation of playforms in language texts and cultural practices Tracing trajectories in theories of play and game and with particular attention to the writings of Nietzsche Wittgenstein Bakhtin and Derrida the author argues that the concept of play provides perspectives on language and communication processes useful both for analysis of literary texts and also for understanding the interactive nature of constructions of knowledge Exploring manifestations of game and play throughout the history of Western culture from Plato to Pynchon this study traces developments in 20th century cultural and literary theory of ideas about play in the writings of Johan Huizinga Roger Caillois Jacques Ehrmann Bernard Suits James Hans Mihai Spariosu and Robert Rawdon Wilson The author emphasizes post structuralist developments with specific attention to deconstruction and reception theory and argues that deconstruction makes the most significant recent contribution to play theory in its application to language and to literature The work also explores the modes and effects of playforms in particular examples of postmodernist fiction With attention to major works from Thomas Pynchon *Gravity* *Rainbow* John Barth *LETTERS* Robert Kroetsch *What the Crow Said* Angela Carter *Nights at the Circus* and Peter Carey *Illywhacker* Edwards acknowledges and deconstructs such basic oppositions as play and seriousness fiction and truth difference and identity to explore the literature's cultural political significance Seeking to affirm the fiction's continuing social relevance the readings presented in this book place play irresistibly at the heartland of language meaning and culture

*The Art of Art History* Donald Preziosi, 1998 What is art history Why how and where did it originate and how have its aims and methods changed over time The history of art has been written and rewritten since classical antiquity Since the foundation of the modern discipline of art history in Germany in the late eighteenth century debates about art and its histories have intensified Historians philosophers psychologists and anthropologists among others have changed our notions of what art history has been is and might be This anthology is a guide to understanding art history through a critical reading of the field's most innovative and influential texts over the past two centuries Each section focuses on a key issue aesthetics style history as an art iconography and semiology gender modernity and postmodernity deconstruction and museology More than thirty

readings from writers as diverse as Winckelmann Kant Gombrich Warburg Panofsky Heidegger Lisa Tickner Meyer Schapiro Jacques Derrida Mary Kelly Michel Foucault Rosalind Krauss Louis Marin Margaret Iversen and Nestor Canclini are brought together and Donald Preziosi's introductions to each topic provide background information bibliographies and critical elucidations of the issues at stake His own concluding essay is an important and original contribution to scholarship in the field From the pre-publication reviews Until now anthologies about the history of art have tended to be worthy yet inert plotting a linear evolution from the great precursors Vasari Winckelmann to the founding fathers of the modern discipline Wolfflin Riegl Panofsky to the achievements and refinements of today's scholarship The texts that Donald Preziosi has brought together provide something far more challenging the juxtapositions and alignments between individual essays point the reader towards unresolved problems ongoing debates and paths not taken or not taken yet In place of the consoling tale of intellectual progress the collection defamiliarizes the whole field and opens up a space for radical reflection on its basic procedures and assumptions Definitely the best introduction to art history currently available Professor Norman Bryson Harvard University Donald Preziosi has prepared an anthology from the Greek a collection of flowers of art history His bouquet contains representatives from the discipline's two hundred year history arranged in standard and innovative methodological categories Within each the readings selected provide stimulating congruencies and contradictions that will inspire productive debate and contemplation But what makes this anthology more than an arresting assemblage is the author's critical stance toward what he has wrought His introduction and concluding chapter write around and under the subjects presented emphasizing the art of art history its kinship with modernity's post-Enlightenment project and its collaboration with the rise of nationalism Thus the discipline's past is probed and questioned and made relevant for its present and future The whole thereby addresses without healing or concealing the disciplinary ruptures of modernism The book might also have explored further nature of art history's history within the emergent discourse of post-colonialism and the globalization of culture Yet the many new perspectives it does offer help to re-present the discipline for its readers students teachers and curators for other areas of humanistic inquiry which are being subject to similar critiques and for artists and the larger art community for whom history narrative and an accounting of art's past have once again become vital issues Professor Robert S Nelson Professor of Art History and Chair Committee for the History of Culture University of Chicago Rather than focusing on its Vasarian moment or on the later academic institutionalization of art history in the 19th and 20th centuries Donald Preziosi in *The Art of Art History* constructs a reading of this hegemonic and reductive practice of making the visible legible as one that is inextricably tied to the museographic paradigm of late 18th and early 19th centuries This shift he sees as equivalent in importance to the brought by the invention of perspective But the author goes further than to underline the implication of art history with the premises of modernity he makes a strong case in a vivid and inspiring prose for a tighter equation between art history and modernity an equation grounded in his insightful considerations and

meteoric formulations of the epistemological setting rhetorical operations political colonialist aims and schizophrenic yet all
 invasive aestheticization of knowledge that in the last two centuries have fashioned what we will no longer dare to call the
 discipline of art history The result is a flamboyant book that offers anything but a celebratory reading of art history It does
 not constitute an articulation of canonical texts or an up to date menu of art historical currents methods or trends Yet it
 manages to avoid none of these dimensions Art history is not envisaged as the learned discourse of modernity on a specific
 class of objects nor is it reduced to a genealogy of outstanding artist subjects and their volatile constellations of
 contemporary subjects readers It becomes a practice wherein objects and subjects relate and relations often crystallize under
 the unrecognized aegis of the fetish this Other of art since Preziosi concisely defines art as the anti fetish fetish Far from the
 fantastic neutrality that is traditionally found in the format of such an historiographic endeavour Preziosi frames his selection
 of text and threads through them with an array of different strategic voices superimposed to stress a spatial figure he is keen
 to discern in order to elaborate a strong polemic position that situates art history as an enduring and well disguised fictional
 genre In the process the author courageously takes on the paradox that is at the core of his project to introduce students to
 the coming out of art history as art one that is not necessarily meant to be our coming out of it but that certainly well
 establishes our motives to continue to shake its grounds and its multi storied apparatus Professor Johanne Lamoureux

 ethical and political consciousness with a commitment to the novel as a work of fiction In this study written in 1998 Dominic
 Head assesses Coetzee's position as a white South African writer engaged with the legacy of colonialism Through close
 readings of all the novels Head shows how Coetzee inhabits a transitional site between Europe and Africa and it is from this
 position that his more general concerns emerge Coetzee's engagement with the problems facing the postcolonial writer Head

international writers Seamus Heaney was the conference's keynote speaker *Multiple Voices* Centre d'Etudes Canadiennes (Bruxelles), 1990 *Postmodern Studies*, 1995 **Carnival of Repetition** John Johnston, 1990 Although published many decades ago William Gaddis's *The Recognitions* is only now beginning to receive the critical attention it deserves *Carnival of Repetition* the first full length study of the novel is a sophisticated analysis that places it in a new literary and cultural context This novel of the 1950s is unlike anything else from that decade It harks back to the works of high modernism exemplified by Joyce's *Ulysses* and looks forward to postmodern fiction especially as practiced by Barth Pynchon and DeLillo Imitation is its major theme one that Gaddis pursues on many levels across several continents into mazes of arcane knowledge and bogus scholarship and even into the novel's structure through the repetition of prior texts and the interplay between literal and disguised quotation Through an endless play of repetition Gaddis confounds the reader's recognition of similarity and difference Johnston uses the theories of Bakhtin and Deleuze and others such as Julia Kristeva to map out a context for this most unusual and difficult work From Bakhtin he appropriates the concepts of carnivalesque fiction and dialogism or a plurality of independent voices no one more important than another From Deleuze he borrows the idea of the simulacrum a copy that presupposes no original and that becomes meaningful through a process of infinite repetition With these instruments Johnston analyzes the labyrinth of copy and counterfeit that Gaddis constructs in his novel *B.S.* Johnson Philip Tew, 2001 Salman Rushdie is one of the world's most important writers of politicised fiction He is a self-proclaimed controversialist capable of exciting radically divergent viewpoints a novelist of extraordinary imaginative range and power and an erudite and often fearless commentator upon the state of global politics today In this comprehensive and lucid critical study Andrew Teverson examines the intellectual biographical literary and cultural contexts from which Rushdie's fiction springs in order to help the reader make sense of the often complex debates that surround the life and work of this major contemporary figure Teverson also offers detailed critical readings of all Rushdie's novels from *Grimus* through to *Shalimar the Clown* This definitive guide will be of interest to those working in the fields of contemporary world writing in English postcolonial studies twentieth and twenty first century British literatures and studies in the novel
