Theatre Noise Lynne Kendrick, David Roesner, 2012-01-24 This book is a timely contribution to the emerging field of the aurality of theatre and looks in particular at the interrogation and problematisation of theatre sound s Both approaches are represented in the idea of noise which we understand both as a concrete sonic entity and a metaphor or theoretical sometimes even ideological thrust Theatre provides a unique habitat for noise It is a place where friction can be thematised explored playfully even indulged in friction between signal and receiver between sound and meaning between eye and ear between silence and utterance between hearing and listening In an aesthetic world dominated by aesthetic redundancy and aerodynamic signs theatre noise recalls the aesthetic and political power of the grain of performance Theatre noise is a new term which captures a contemporary agitated acoustic aesthetic It expresses the innate theatricality of sound design and performance articulates the reach of auditory spaces the art of vocality the complexity of acts of audience the political in produced noises Indeed one of the key contentions of this book is that noise in most cases is to be understood as a plural as a composite of different noises as layers or waves of noises Facing a plethora of possible noises in performance and theatre we sought to collocate a wide range of notions of and approaches to noise in this book by no means an exhaustive list of possible readings and understandings but a starting point from which scholarship like sound could travel in many directions
