Erikson's Psychosocial Stages of Development

Erik Erikson believed we develop through eight stages across our lifetime, each with a key conflict we must resolve.

1. **Trust vs. Mistrust (Birth–18 months):** Trust in caregivers vs. fear and suspicion.
2. **Autonomy vs. Shame and Doubt (18 months–3 years):** Independence vs. shame and doubt.
3. **Initiative vs. Guilt (3–6 years):** Sense of purpose vs. guilt.
4. **Industry vs. Inferiority (6–12 years):** Pride in accomplishments vs. feeling inferior.
5. **Identity vs. Role Confusion (12–18 years):** Strong identity vs. confusion about self.
6. **Intimacy vs. Isolation (18–40 years):** Deep relationships vs. loneliness.
7. **Generativity vs. Stagnation (40–65 years):** Purposeful work and mentoring vs. unproductivity.
8. **Integrity vs. Despair (65+ years):** Wisdom and satisfaction vs. regret and despair.

Piaget's Theory of Cognitive Development

Jean Piaget focused on how children's thinking develops through four stages:

1. **Sensorimotor Stage (Birth–2 years):** Learning through senses and movement; development of object permanence.
2. **Preoperational Stage (2–7 years):** Symbolic thinking; egocentrism; no logical reasoning yet.
3. **Concrete Operational Stage (7–11 years):** Logical thinking about concrete things; understanding conservation; less egocentric.
4. **Formal Operational Stage (12+ years):** Abstract thinking; hypothetical reasoning; strategic planning.

Summary:

- Erikson = Emotional/social development across life.
- Piaget = Cognitive/thinking development mainly during childhood and adolescence.
