


Individual Taxes Are the Most Important Tax Revenue Source for the United States

Principles of tax policy Great Britain: Parliament: House of Commons: Treasury Committee, 2011-03-15 The Treasury Committee welcomes the Government's commitment to a new approach to tax policy making designed to support its ambition for a more predictable stable and simple system But the Government has not done enough to set out the principles underlying that policy The Committee attempts to identify these principles and considers how tax policy can best support growth A tax system which is theoretically structured to promote growth will not succeed if businesses are faced with constant change or if the inefficiency of collection outweighs any benefits The report warns that a tax system which is felt to be fundamentally unfair will quickly lose political
