Department of Education & Professional Studies, 2010 The thesis aims to contribute to debates in social anthropology concerning the distinctiveness of the discipline and investigates the way the notion of thinking anthropologically can be understood This is achieved through a focus on the practices of anthropologists and students in the academy in the UK Much discussion concerning the discipline's distinctiveness has examined the discipline's object of study its ethnographic research practice and writing conventions Typically less attention has been given to academic processes of disciplinary production The thesis suggests that the notion thinking anthropologically is a particular academic construct which is produced through participation in specific sets of relationships in the academy The thesis therefore questions received wisdom in the discipline concerning the central place of ethnographic research in becoming an anthropologist and also contributes to the trajectory of reflexive work the discipline has undertaken in the last thirty years Chapter 1 introduces the question of anthropology's distinctiveness I highlight key areas of anthropological practice which may contribute to this particularly the method of ethnographic fieldwork I examine the double location Strathern 1999 of anthropology in the field and academy and emphasise how anthropology's ways of knowing arise through the particular relation between these Chapter 2 uses the work of Pierre Bourdieu to continue the discussion on theory and practice and situate the research topic on the academic field of anthropology further I describe the methodology of the thesis and the methods through which I carried out the research Chapter 3 looks at early encounters of undergraduates with anthropology focusing on the practices in which students
