## Population Measures

$$\text{Mean } \mu = \frac{1}{n} \sum x_i \quad (1)$$

$$\text{Variance } \sigma^2 = \frac{1}{n} \sum (x_i - \bar{x})^2 \quad (2)$$

$$\text{Standard Deviation } \sigma = \sqrt{\frac{1}{n} \sum (x_i - \bar{x})^2} \quad (3)$$
