Falling Man Don DeLillo, 2007-05-15 There is September 11 and then there are the days after and finally the years Falling Man is a magnificent essential novel about the event that defines turn of the century America It begins in the smoke and ash of the burning towers and tracks the aftermath of this global tremor in the intimate lives of a few people First there is Keith walking out of the rubble into a life that he d always imagined belonged to everyone but him Then Lianne his estranged wife memory haunted trying to reconcile two versions of the same shadowy man And their small son Justin standing at the window scanning the sky for more planes These are lives choreographed by loss grief and the enormous force of history Brave and brilliant Falling Man traces the way the events of September 11 have reconfigured our emotional landscape our memory and our perception of the world It is cathartic beautiful heartbreaking

**The Mechanics of Claims and Permissible Killing in War** Alec D. Walen, 2019-03-15 According to the dominant account of rights there are two ways to permissibly kill people they have done something to forfeit their right to life or their rights are outweighed by the significantly greater cost of respecting them Contemporary just war theorists tend to agree that it is difficult to justify killing in the second way Thus they focus on the conditions under which rights might be forfeited But it has proven hard to defend an account of forfeiture that permits killing when and only when it is morally justifiable In *The Mechanics of Claims and Permissible Killing in War* Alec D Walen develops an alternative account of rights according to which rights forfeiture has a much smaller role to play It plays a smaller role because rights themselves are more contextually contingent They systematically reflect the different kinds of claims people can make on an agent For example those who threaten to cause harm without a right to do so have weaker claims not to be killed than innocent bystanders or those who have a right to threaten to cause harm By framing rights as the output of a balance of competing claims and by laying out a detailed account of how to balance competing claims Walen provides a more coherent account of when killing in war is permissible

*The Cultural Life of Catastrophes and Crises* Carsten Meiner, Kristin Veel, 2012-10-30 Catastrophes and crises are exceptions They are disruptions of order In various ways and to different degrees they change and subvert what we regard as normal They may occur on a personal level in the form of traumatic or stressful situations on a social level in the form of unstable political financial or religious situations or on a global level in the form of environmental states of emergency The main assumption in this book is that in contrast to the directness of any given catastrophe and its obvious physical economical and psychological consequences our understanding of catastrophes and crises is shaped by our cultural imagination No matter in which eruptive and traumatizing form we encounter them our collective repertoire of symbolic forms historical sensibilities modes of representation and patterns of imagination determine how we identify analyze and deal with catastrophes and crises This book presents a series of articles investigating how we address and interpret catastrophes and crises in film literature art and theory ranging from Voltaire s eighteenth century Europe haunted by revolutions and earthquakes to the 1994 genocide in Rwanda to the bleak prophetic
