The Study of Dyslexia Martin Turner, John Rack, 2006-01-16 In long ago 1999 the Dyslexia Institute and Plenum Press conceived a plan for two books which would gather the best of current knowledge and practice in dyslexia studies This would benefit those but not only those many individuals who train with us acquiring a postgraduate certificate and diploma with our higher education partner the University of York Since then the century changed the hinge of history creaked and Plenum was taken over by Kluwer Academic Publishers but the first of the pair *Dyslexia in Practice* emerged quickly and on schedule Townsend and Turner 2000 Written by staff and close associates of the Institute its chapters were produced under close scrutiny and with the expedition of a command economy To our delight the book has seen a success which went beyond the dreams of its editors it has been adopted by other courses similar to our own and is widely referred to The same was never likely to be true of *The Study of Dyslexia* which was envisaged as a theoretical companion volume written by authors and researchers of international repute Nearly five years after the idea first took shape this second volume now arrives to complete the enterprise but it has been a very different project

A Longitudinal Study of Dyslexia Hans-Jörgen Gjessing, Bjorn Karlsen, 2012-12-06 Psychological and educational researchers in the Scandinavian countries have cooperated in a research effort relating to children s learning disabilities for more than a decade Support has come from the federal governments and other funding agencies in Norway Sweden and Denmark through the Secretariat for Scandinavian Cultural Cooperation A number of independent studies have already been published dealing with various aspects of learning disabilities in the literacy skills of reading and writing The largest and most comprehensive study was the Bergen Project a longitudinal study of an entire cohort of children with special emphasis on those who developed specific learning disabilities in reading and writing dyslexia These dyslexic children were studied diagnosed and treated over a period of nine years along with various control and comparison groups which included a large subgroup with general learning disabilities retarded The Bergen Project involved the collection of voluminous data The children were identified by means of special diagnostic tests and treated using remedial materials and techniques that had been developed to deal with various types of dyslexia The ophthalmology team not only tested the children but they also prescribed and provided glasses and even performed surgery when necessary The pediatric neurologists did general pediatric and neurological examinations following up many of the cases with EEGs and CT

Hayes, 2006 Dyslexia is a brain based type of learning disability that specifically impairs a person s ability to read Although the disorder varies from person to person common characteristics among people with dyslexia are difficulty with phonological processing the manipulation of sounds and or rapid visual verbal responding The syndrome of dyslexia does not imply low intelligence or poor educational potential and is independent of race and social background Although dyslexia seems to be more prevalent among males than females the exact ratio is unknown the most commonly quoted figures are between 3 1 and 5 1 The evidence suggests that in at least two thirds of cases dyslexia has a genetic cause but in

Todd Rose,2007 Emerging findings from genetic neurological and cognitive studies of dyslexia are beginning to provide researchers and educators unprecedented insights into the nature of reading failure Converging interdisciplinary evidence supports a highly complex and multi componential view of dyslexia in marked contrast to single deficit cognitive models that prevail in research and practice suggesting the need for a dynamic developmental approach capable of characterizing the complex interactions among multiple biological cognitive and environmental factors The shift in interdisciplinary research toward a more integrated and contextualized view of dyslexia along with an explicit focus on the central importance of developmental factors will likely have immediate implications for the way reading failure is characterized in adolescence In this dissertation

I present the findings from an individual differences study of fluency in oral reading of connected text in 77 adolescents with dyslexia. The key finding from this study is that verbal short term memory is a significant predictor of oral reading fluency in adolescents with dyslexia but the magnitude of its effect changes greatly with amount of expressive vocabulary knowledge. Specifically, whereas the effect of verbal short term memory on oral reading fluency is strongest with lower levels of vocabulary, it becomes much weaker with higher levels of vocabulary knowledge. These findings provide some support for the changing nature of dyslexic symptoms across development and offer evidence in favor of a more dynamic developmental systems approach to the study of reading failure in adolescence.
